SUSITNA DOC FINDER FROM ARLIS

ARLIS recently launched the new Susitna Doc Finder (http://www.arlis.org/susitnadocfinder/), featuring full-text indexing and retrieval of more than 4,000 historic and recent reports from all phases of the Susitna Hydroelectric Project (SuHydro Project), as well as those documents continually being produced since 2010 under the current Susitna-Watana Hydroelectric Project (SuWa Project). It features:

- Google-style searches or traditional searches by author, title, report number, topic, etc.
- Mobile-friendly usage on devices of all sizes and shapes
- Cover images of all PDFs

Access to historic reports has been identified as a baseline requirement on which to build for today's researchers. The Susitna Doc Finder makes it easy to identify relevant reports and contributes to the permanent record of these important scientific studies.

The Susitna Doc Finder is completely updated each evening, Monday through Friday. During the evening rebuild, the Doc Finder returns zero results to any query. The rebuild is completed in the early hours of the next morning, well before 8 am.

LITERARY, LITERACY AWARD NOMINATIONS DUE 5/31/2016

Nominations are being accepted for 2016 Contributions to Literacy in Alaska (CLIA) Awards. The program is a statewide effort to recognize people and agencies who support literature and literacy in the north.

The awards, presented by Alaska Center for the Book annually since 1993, honor individuals and institutions who have made a significant contribution to literacy efforts, to the literary arts, or preservation of the written or spoken word in Alaska. Past winners include librarians, teachers, writers, tutors, learning programs, volunteers and others dedicated to making the world a better place through the gift of language. Last years' winners were historian Dee Longenbaugh of Juneau: Barrow author Debby Dahl Edwardson; Dr. Edna McLean of Anchorage, author of an Inupiaq-English dictionary; and "Alaska Spirit of Reading," a literacy program based in Sitka.

Although the initial deadline was in April, the deadline has been extended to May 31. Nomination forms are available on-line at Alaska Center for the Book's web site, http://www.alaskacenterforthebook.org or by calling 907-786-4379.

Awards will be presented in July during the University of Alaska's Northern Renaissance Arts and Sciences reading series, held in conjunction with UAA's MFA program in Creative Writing.

Alaska Center for the Book is Alaska's affiliate to the Library of Congress Center for the Book. The non-profit, all-volunteer board partners with literary, educational, arts and humanities organizations to host and sponsor events across the state, including Reading Rendezvous, Alaska Reads, Poems in Place, Letters About Literature and more.
